About the Ruben L. Speaks Lecture Series

The Ruben L. Speaks Lecture Series is named in honor of the late Bishop Ruben Lee Speaks, who served in the A.M.E. Zion Church as bishop, pastor, preacher, teacher, and writer. Bishop Speaks authored A Handbook for Ministers and Lay Leaders, The Minister and His Task, The Church and Black Liberation, God in an Age of Scarcity, and Prelude to Pentecost. Bishop Speaks received the Chancellor's Award from the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Brooklyn Advisory Committee of the New York Urban League. Ebony Magazine once named him one of the "100 Most Influential Black Leaders in America." As Bishop, he served in Africa, the Caribbean, and the United States. He was acknowledged on numerous occasions for his leadership and creative engagement in ministry. When he presided over the Liberia Conference, the late President of Liberia, William Tolbert, dubbed him, "Knight of African Redemption."

Blessings from the Haley Farm Experience 2023

The Children's Defense Fund sponsors the Samuel Dewitt Proctor Institute for Child Advocacy Ministry and the Dale Andrews Freedom Seminary (DAFS) annually in July. The 2023 theme was "Freedom Faith at 50" noting the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the birth of the Children's Defense Fund. Hood's involvement began in 2016 under the leadership of Dr. Charlene Sinclair. Our participation continues and grows. This year only one student (Fredrick Cannady-Kelderman) took the course for credit. But the Hood family present included alumni, Steve Dowling and Valtoria Jackson, plus fellow student John Campbell. Dowling brought his family, including his sons Christian and Cameron who participated in the Freedom School for youth.

Reflections from Frederick Cannady-Kelderman

Dale Andrews Freedom Seminary (DAFS) provided an opportunity for me to explore new possibilities and avenues for ministry as I continue to engage in working with the younger generation. The opportunity to meet authors and engage with fellow seminarians was very meaningful. The wealth of resources and wide range of testimonies were quite helpful. A project which I started last semester continues to take new life and direction. I look forward to the outcome of my project this semester and its real impact on the younger generation.

Reflections on the Freedom School from Christian Dowling

"Here are three positives about Freedom School. First, I was able to meet a lot of new people. I also was able to go to a lot of cool places as we went on a few field trips to a museum, a zoo, and the Junior Achievement Center. Lastly, overall, I had a fun time. But I also had some bad experiences on the trip. Like one, there were a lot of flies that kept getting in my food because we ate outside. Another thing was the long walk from the road to the camp. We took this walk over and over again; but, overall, I had an okay experience and would want to go again."

Reflections of Freedom School from Cameron Dowling

In this I will give my positive and negative thoughts on Freedom School, 2023. Positive: I like that a major point of Freedom School is to meet new people and to make a lot of friends. The counselors were not too pushy on making friends, but they made it a safe space to make friends if I was comfortable. I liked the locations we visited (achievement center and Museum.) as they were fun and exciting. I learned a lot from each of the spots we visited. I loved how all the kids, and the people were nice and accepting of everything that I did and nobody there was mean or hostile. Everything showed that a lot of effort went into planning and nothing seemed low budget whatsoever.

Negative: To be completely honest, I do not really have any negative thoughts but here are a few details that I would like to share. I would love it if there were a few more activities and competitive things to do for the children to do. The second day was a little boring. An event like a scavenger hunt (wink, wink) or something where there is somewhat of a winner, but there does not necessarily have to be a prize, just something that all the kids can participate in together would be super helpful. A team bonding activity so kids can bond with each other would also be good because 90% of the time when kids are together to achieve a task, they start to bond a lot better and quicker, and it also helps kids come out of their shell. On a real note, I absolutely loved it and would love to come back whenever the next event is and cannot wait to come back.

Reflections from Rev. Steve Dowling

Attending the Children's Defense Fund's Proctor Institute this year was again an enjoyable and rewarding experience. There seems to always be so many different perspectives shared to heighten awareness of how to better care for the well-being of children. I gleaned just as much, even more as an alum, than I did on my initial experience as a student in 2022.

From a Hood Community perspective, I wished I could have caravanned with Dr. Love and fellow Hood students, but I was able to travel with my wife and two sons. Of course, Dr. Love made herself available the entire conference for questions and continuous learning but being able to share this community with my young men made this quite the occasion for me. The first day of Proctor was specifically for academia and DAFS, but still my family was able to come along and sit in on a couple of sessions. As soon as those sessions concluded, it was as if my sons attended a conversation starter class. They asked numerous questions, and I loved being a dad who could facilitate the answering sessions over dinner or while we commuted back and forth to the farm.


I continued to feel that the word "intentional" was the theme of what the Proctor Institute desired for the weeklong visitors to receive and retain. As I learned about the work of Marian Wright Edelman and others like Prathia Hall, I kept feeling as if I was not doing enough to care for others. Learning about them creates a very compelling urgency to do whatever you can to consider and promote the wellbeing of others.

I am hopeful that I can continue to take time each year to connect with the Children's Defense Fund and the Proctor Institute. I want to find a way to encourage some of my church members to attend also with this being a very Christian oriented setting. Bringing church members to a place dedicated to caring just feels like a cannot lose partnership to me.

Dr. Love led a workshop entitled "Celebrating the Vision and Legacy of the Children's Defense Fund – 1973-2023." It shared the experiences of Dr. Marian Wright Edelman that provided the motivation to bring about effective change in the lives of children who were living in poverty. Thus, the Children's Defense Fund (CDF) was born with a

mission to ensure that every child has a healthy start, a head start, a fair start, a safe start, and a moral start. It was also an opportunity to look at the milestone accomplishments of CDF and the acquisition of Alex Haley's Farm to become a training ground for child advocacy.
